The Badminton Oceania Annual General Meeting was held on 21 February 2016 at the Ellerslie International Motor Inn, Ellerslie, Auckland. The Oceania Executive Board consists of Geraldine Brown, President (Australia), Nigel Skelt (Deputy President, NZ) Board Members: Loke Poh Wong (Australia), Gail Eraio (Cook Islands), Amanaki Latu (Tonga), Johanna Kou (New Caledonia), Michael Alezrah (Tahiti). Oceania Staff: Julie Carrel, Secretary Gen-

eral/CEO, (NZ) Lynne Nixey Administration Manager, (NZ) Nadia Bleaken, (NZ), Robbie Thackham (NZ) The Cook Islands Oceania Board member Mrs Gail Eraio attended this AGM with our President Thomas Ngauru attending also as a delegate. Board members terms on the Oceania Board are two year rotational with the change this year being Mrs Leody Vainikolo of Tonga, replaced by Dr Amanaki Latu.

2016 saw the Oceania Board hold four meetings – physically meeting twice with two Skype conferences . A new member Papua New Guinea was welcomed this year. With the addition of this new member the Oceania region now consists of NZ, Australia, Cook Islands, Fiji, Tahiti, Guam, New Caledonia, Papua New Guinea, Tonga, Northern Marianas, Kiribati, Nauru, Norfolk Island, Samoa, Tuvalu. A major undertaking this year was the Badminton Oceania Strategic Plan 2016-2020 developed with the assistance and expertise of Mr Talemo Waqa, Oceania Regional Training Manager. Mr Waqa also does strategic planning for ONOC in the Oceania region. Cook Islands Badminton Association says a huge "meitaki maata" to Oceania Badminton for all their financial and administrative support, and advice over this year.

BWF AGM

What an experience !!! As the current Cook Island representative on the Oceania Badminton Board I attended this 77th BWF AGM and participated in an extremely interesting 4 days. Flying Air NZ with other Oceania Board members we arrived at Shanghai Pudong International Airport at 7.30am Thursday morning and were met by the Tournament Organising committee and were taken by bus for the two hour trip to our accommodation, the Jingling Grand Hotel, Kunshan. All meetings were held in the hotel – there were 25 floors in the Jingling Grand Hotel with one whole floor devoted to meeting rooms and halls. The main hall, Jingling Hall, catered for the huge BWF AGM of over 118 delegates who represented 105 countries worldwide. Oceania members attended the following meetings: Oceania Board meeting on Thursday 19th, the BWF Members Forum on Friday 20th, the BWF AGM on Saturday 21st and the BWF Women in Badminton meeting on Sunday 22nd.

The BWF AGM is an annual event held in conjunction with one of the top World Badminton events -Thomas and Uber Cup Tournament. Not all work and no play- we had the opportunity of seeing some of the semi final matches for Thomas and Uber Cup on the Saturday afternoon. Certainly made one want to aspire (at least) to those standards. Mixing and mingling with people from so many continents and countries around the world was an enlightening experience and reinforced the fact that while we are different culturally we all have some similarities – friendly and hospitable being two of them. Shanghai is a city with millions of inhabitants covering a huge area, flats, apartments and accommodations as far as the eye could see, motorways of 3 to 4 tiers, - one could get lost very easily, some truly magnificent buildings, the oldest having been built during the time of the British, French and American occupation in the mid

1800's, restaurants and eateries galore with food suiting most tastes. Transport was a diverse mix – old fashioned bicycles with a trailer on the back, 3 wheeler trikes, scooters, modern cars and even the old hand cart that we saw being used by the Chinese workers who were here on Rarotonga for the Te Mato Vai project.

Appreciative thanks go to the Badminton World Federation, Oceania Badminton Board and Administration, and Cook Islands Badminton for making this trip possible in so many ways.

OSEP Training

In April Hebrew Tom, Thomas Ngauru and Ngaoa Ranginui attended an OSEP training course held at CISNOC Olympic House and was delivered by Siniva Marsters and also attended by Makiroa Mitchell, President of Handball Cook Islands. The purpose of this course was a build up for Hebrew who would be attending the Para-Badminton workshop in Melbourne, Australia. The course was also to help CIBA develop their skills in being able to deliver programmes, organise training & coaching and game structures. Also the different roles in administration and how to run the association



properly working alongside the stakeholders, community organisations and other sports codes. We were challenged to create a new type of tournament associated with badminton with a little twist. So the new game we came up with was called "FANTASTIC FOUR". The whole aspect of the sports course gave us a wider knowledge and insight to the sport Hebrew Tom we love.

Level 1 Coaching Course



BWF Level 1 Course 30th April to 1st May 2016 was held in Auckland over two weekends. The first Level 1 course was held at Epsom Girls Grammar School. Handily, the accommodation was a short walking distance from the venue. We met with Rose from Tonga and Johanna from New Caledonia as we were sharing accommodation. On the morning of Level 1 the three of us met our co-trainees; in total there were 20 who attended the course and came from Palmerston North, and of course the island ladies. Our tutors were Robbie Thackham and Fanny Megahwati and they were really knowledgeable and so helpful during the course. They had us introduce

ourselves around the room, and once a topic was introduced on court work they mixed the groups up to demonstrate concepts such as movement to shuttle and back to recovery position.

There was heaps of court work, with the most enjoyable segment watching one particular participant with amazing ability of feeding shuttles continuously. There were group discussions on Performance Factors, Tactics, Space, self and opponent awareness, Base position.

The second part of the BWL Level 1 was held in Auckland 20th August to the 21st August 2016 and we stayed at the same place sharing with Johanna at the same accommodation as before. The venue changed; we went to Waitakarere Badminton Hall and the same 20 attended.

The second part of the course we recapped our first weekend, then we moved on to Performance Factors – Tactics, Doubles tactics, Mixed Tactics for 75mins. And then 30mins for groups to deliver 3 lessons including warn up, and then 60mins feedback in groups to review and evaluate each groups sessions. Then finally a summary on day 3 and prepare for day 4. All 20 of us were assessed by Robbie Thackham, Fanny Megawhati and Tracey Hallam. My assessor was Robbie Thackham and the day after our training he gave me my lesson which was Forehand Net Drop. When I got my result from Robbie I was excited seeing that I did well in my Theory Test Assessment, Strengths in Planning, structured sessions and good use of questioning to encourage thinking. I received a Provisional Pass that I am very happy with for now. A big meitaki maata to BWF and Oceania Badminton especially Nadia & Lynne for making my travel so easy.

I must admit it was fun scooting around on the court in a wheelchair.



The Primary School teachers course was a first for our primary school teachers that came from Immamuela Akatemia, Apii Rutaki, Arorangi School, St Joseph School and Takitumu School. There were over 14 teachers that attended the course ranging from new entrants to grade 6. The main focus was working on basic hand eye coordination with the use of balloons. And because this was also the first time for them to try out badminton it was important that they were confident to deliver the programme by the end of the course. To finish things off we had discussions to plan lessons for the next 3 weeks and proposed dates for the primary school tournament in 2017.

College Programme

Over 350 students took part in this years college programme from year 7 through to year 13. Schools included Nukutere College, Titikaveka College, Tereora College, Papaaroa School, Te Uki Ou & Apii Avarua. We were pleased to welcome first timers to the programme Apii Avarua who started off enthusiastically with classes out on their outdoor tennis courts then moving to the Mangaia Hostel where with assistance from CIBA two courts were lined and used for the remainder of the term. Apii Avarua has the largest enrolment of Year 7 & Year 8 students in the country with a lot of talent and potential which was evident from day one.

Apii Te Uki Ou was also participating in the ShuttleTime programme for the first time. And even though volunteers were unavailable to assist with classes at the school it was good to see parents bring their children to afterschool classes.

The level of play amongst the students had improved immensely from the year previous which allowed tutors to deliver more advanced classes. A lot of focus on improving basic skills, tactics, scoring and umpiring.

As in last years programme Year 7 classes were always a challenge as these players had little or no understanding of how to play badminton. But with the commencement of our Primary School ShutlleTime programme for year 4 to year 6 students they will be taught the basic badminton skills much earlier.

It has always been a challenge accommodating so many students with limited playing facilities but teachers have always found a way to deliver the classes efficiently. What has also made classes easier to deliver are the ShuttleTime resources & plenty of equipment available. It's important that the schools are well equipped and receive support from the association as many codes have failed do this and are losing the support of the schools or have been removed from the schools sport calendar.

We hope to welcome Immanuela Akatemia, Arorangi School and Nikao School to the college programme in 2017 achieving full participation from all secondary classes on Rarotonga. And just as exciting there are



plans to begin delivering Shuttletime in the outer islands beginning with Araura College on the beautiful island of Aitutaki. We would like to say a big meitaki maata to the schools and volunteers who gave up their time to help teachers deliver the ShuttleTime programme.

2nd Inter College Tournament




A week before the 2nd Inter College Tournament was to be held, CIBA received approval for the use of the Bluesky Sports Arena, previously known as Telecom Sports Arena. The CIBA committee and volunteers quickly got together and taped down 8 courts in record time. This Tournament was to be the first ever badminton event to be held in the complex after waiting eagerly for some years. Our previ-

ous tournaments had been held in Princess Anne Hall at Tereora College which only had 4 courts but is still being used for social night games.

Six schools entered this year's tournament – they being Tereora College, Nukutere College, Titikaveka College, Papaaroa College, Te Uki Ou and Avarua School. Over 120 students participated in the tournament representing their schools in either the Juniors (year 7 & 8) or Senior (year 9 & 10) divisions with each division featuring boys, girls and mixed doubles. Matches were 10 minutes for each round of the round robin with a change of ends at 5 minutes. The kids played to their hearts content with some real amazing rallies and outstanding performances. The games were umpired by the CIBA committee, volunteers and 2016 AIMS Games squad members who were using the tournament as part of their preparations for the September competition. Having 8 courts allowed us to play more matches and allow more students to compete and more court time. The new setup in BSA was a bonus with its permanent seating enabling parents and spectators to get a good view of all the games. Over 150 matches were played without delay with the competition and prize-giving completed right on time. Next year CIBA we will be introducing singles as part of the Senior Division competition. With the AIMS Games now part of the badminton calendar and the anticipation of further overseas competitions we need to provide more singles competition for our students. Our volunteers & Sponsors were the backbone of our day with CITC and Avarua Bakery supplying very healthy snack packs to keep the players energy levels up and hunger pains down. Primary School Programme



Takitumu Primary School, Arorangi School, Rutaki School, St Joseph's and Akatemia Emmanuela all took part in our Primary Schools ShuttleTime Badminton Program all held in their respective school grounds. Approximately 400 students participated in the programme from year 2 up to year 6. Students were so excited to have an opportunity to finally have badminton at school and the excitement grew with every session. Tutors did well to encourage the teachers to actively take part in delivering the lessons and not just at CIBA scheduled times. It was the first time for CIBA to work with students this young and tutors were a little doubtful initially but by the second sessions the students were improving in leaps and bounds proving the programme a huge success.

Even though frequent inclement weather forced lessons into classrooms the lesson format did not change. St Joseph's School with over 60 children in year 5 & 6 were so keen they took advantage of afternoon classes 4 afternoons a week.

Just Play Village Sports Programme

CIBA joined Just Play Village Festival in March 2015 Rutaki School; the age groups were 5-12 years old. The children began with no idea how to hold the racket or how to hit the shuttle. By the end of session the review showed that 5% enjoyed playing Badminton, and then as Just Play Village Festival progressed each month from Village to Village, the number of children enjoying the play continued to rise.

CIBA again joined the Just Play Festival in 2016. The first session was held in Tupapa (Avarua) where



189 children attended aged from 4-13. At the end of the session 20 children were asked which of the activities they preferred and 10% indicated their favourite of the day was Badminton, because the children from last year came back to play badminton through CIBA promoting the game in the primary schools and colleges

Our second to last Just Play Festival was held in October at Takuvaine. 44 children age 3-13 years attended and seven children were questioned on their involvement in the afternoon's activities with 100% saying they had fun and want to continue playing sports. Of these children 28% enjoyed playing badminton.

Our last Just Play Festival was held at Tupapa and Avarua. 145 Children age 4-13 years attended the festival, with the different codes. The NZ High Commissioner arrived for his first village festival and the Universal Children's Day Colouring Competition. Two Police Officers were present with their motorbikes to help build better community relationships. Kariana Karika attended to help with coaching the children. While watching Kariana interact with the little children a parent said she was amazed with her and was even more impressed when I explained that Kariana is one of our Under 15 members who represented her school at the Aims Games in September. That parent wanted to know how her kids might qualify for the Aims Game which shows the great exposure we get at these monthly events. Having lots of shuttles made it easy for coaching the little one's, supported by the great venues, the promotion on Local TV News, Radio and Newspaper.

AIMS Games 2016

The AIMS Games are an annual school championship held in Tauranga, New Zealand for Year 7 and 8 students from over New Zealand and the pacific competing in over 20 different including badminton . This year over 9,300 intermediate school children participated in what was the largest turnout in the history of the AIMS Games. Trials began in May at Princess Anne Hall, Tereora. These were held over a period of 3 weeks with 30 children vying for a spot in the team that was going to the AIMS Games 2016. The team category's, were boys and girls singles and boys and girls doubles. Selection's of players were made with these categories in mind. It was very difficult to choose the initial as all showed great potential and commitment. 8 students were chosen but after



some deliberations with the CIBA committee and Oceania the final squad was chosen. The 10 players were from Avarua School Kariana Hagai and Nicolea Mateariki and from Nukutere College the girls were Avana Hagai, Unaonga Tiere, Teatuanui George, Eleanor Wichman and the boys were Damus Matakino, Francis Terepo, Vaitoti Tupa & Kiarn Whatarau. Training began straight after selection with 2 hour sessions 4 days a week. In addition a few members of the squad played up in the senior division of the schools inter-college tournament against year 9 & 10 students and reaching the semi-finals of the boys and mixed doubles and the final of the girls senior doubles.

Various events were held to raise funds to help send our Aims Games team to Tauranga. The first event was a Mufti Day held at both Avarua Primary School and Nukutere College with the funds raised going towards expenses for each player and the purchase of gifts for Tauranga Intermediate as part of a cultural exchange. Each school presented a personally engraved 8 string ukulele to their hosts. The next event was a Badminton Marathon held in St Joseph Hall where friends and family sponsored each player to participate in a marathon of badminton related exercises and quizzes. It was a great afternoon of fun with plenty of friends and family sponsoring so generously. Our final event was "Dinner with the Stars" an event to remember which attracted a large crowd of over 120. On the programme were items and a fashion parade performed by the team presenting all their playing and travelling uniforms including their tracksuits sponsored by Bank South Pacific. A big Meitaki Maata to our major sponsor Edgewater Spa and Resort, Bank South Pacific with other contributions from The Islander Hotel and the Badminton Swingers dance troupe.





The next day on Sunday the team and families gathered for Mass at the St Josephs Cathedral and received a special blessing from Fr Freddy for a successful and safe trip. Then 4 days later the team flew from Rarotonga to Auckland, then caught the Intercity Bus to Manukau City where the team changed buses again to the Intercity Line to travel down to Tauranga via Thames and Paeroa. Arriving on Friday afternoon we settled in to out private holiday homes that were in close vicinity of the Badminton venue and right next door to Tauranga Intermediate. The following day we had an cultural exchange with pacific students of Tauranga Intermediate which included the exchange of gifts and nice welcome lunch and welcome cake. Then it was straight into business with a training session with Robbie Thackman alongside the team from Tonga and players representing Tauranga Intermediate. At the end of the session each of our players received a brand new yonex racquet courtesy of Oceania badminton. After a great session we were treated to dinner by Tarita John & family, Teei & Family & Ngaire Utanga at the hot pools the perfect end to a long.

Sunday Grand Opening. What an extravaganza that was! The two teams from the South Pacific, Cook Islands and Tonga received complementary tickets to attend the evening and were said to have given the AIMS Games an international flavour and we were given the royal treatment and brought into the stadium last to a standing ovation



Competition Begins: On Monday the competition kicked off with Boys & Girls Singles Pool play. Each player was placed in a pool of 6 or 7 players then depending on their placing after round robin play they moved forward into the knockouts. Those who came first in their pool went on to Division 1 Knockouts where the medal winners would be decided. Second place in the pool went on to Division 2 Knockouts and so forth. Initial nerves were obvious but once Kiarn took the court for the first game and recorded the teams first win they grew in confidence. Standout performances came from Francis & Kariana who reached the quarter and semi-finals respectively in Division 2. Every day gaining more experience, meeting new people, learning their different styles and techniques and coping in a overseas tournament. Doubles competition began on Wednesday afternoon using the same game format as in the singles competition with our best results coming from Unaonga & Eleanor coming 3rd in Division 2. The exposure for our players was extremely beneficial an ideal tournament for future teams to attend. Overall the team did extremely well are looking forward to carrying on their training. The squad also attended the "Disco Night" held at Tauranga Intermediate Hall and had a ball of a time at "Flipout" Trampoline Park courtesy of the AIMS Games organisers and sponsors who also gave complementary AIMS Games 2016 hoodies for each of our players. On our return we were hosted in Auckland by Alice Marsters and family before landing back in Rarotonga to a airport full of family and supporters who then hosted the team to a Homecoming Dinner and sharing at the St Josephs cathedral basement. 
